Contoocook Village -

quaint, interesting, fun and not too far away

CONTOOCOOK – After receiving and gathering some information about Contoocook, I decided to personally visit the area and talk to a few people in person.

The weather was beautiful on Mother's Day. Taking Route 127 from 202 and crossing the Hopkinton Dam, I felt a little like I was going "to grandmother's house." "Over the river and through the woods," so to speak.

Route 103 runs through the Contoocook Village, curving over the river. The village has that old-time atmosphere, with some modern features. The architecture of the buildings along a little strip of Main Street echoes memories of simpler times.

Mark Winzeler of Union House Oddities wrote this introduction:

"Welcome to Contoocook, an idyllic village on the Contoocook River. Located in the town of Hopkinton, Contoocook or 'Tooky' is a vibrant and lively business district. You'll discover all sorts of creative and interesting shops as well as a local supermarket, 24-hour gas stations, banks, a barber shop and several restaurants. Just off I-89, exit 6, it's just a mile to the center of town where you'll find plenty of parking. Make a day of it.

"While in the village, enjoy the spectacular river views. Walk through the historic longest existing covered train bridge in the country. Stop for a swim, go kayaking, have a picnic at the gazebo, hike or bike the rail trails. History buffs and artists will be delighted.

"A must see is our lovingly restored Contoocook Train Depot (on the National Historic Register). Truly a trip back in time.

Contoocook Cider Company

Contoocook Cider Company, also known as Gould Hill Farm, is not in the village proper but farther down Route 103 on Gould Hill Road. The views along that road are absolutely stunning.

Tim Bassett and his wife Amy have owned the property for about 14 years. The previous owner had 80 varieties of apples. The Bassetts now have over 120 varieties. He said some apples are only good for making hard cider and some for baking. They harvest apples in the fall through the second week of November, depending on the weather.

"We are a family run farm. Our goal is to provide a location where people can come in to experience pick-your-own fruit and take in the amazing views. We want Gould Hill Farm to be a family tradition."

Besides apples, they also have peaches, plums, blueberries and more. Unfortunately, that last freezing spell and brutal wind in May took out the peach and plum blossoms. They might only have blueberries and apples this year.

The tasting room, inside the huge barn on the lower level, is open weekends year-round. There are many awards on the walls celebrating their hard ciders. The ciders, fresh or fermented, are made on site. Some are even sold in several stores in New Hampshire.

Visitors can sample ciders in flights of four or enjoy a 12 oz. glass. Growlers are also sold. Pizza, pretzels, baked goods and more can accompany the tasting.

There are unique blends using many of the 100-plus varieties of apples grown on the farm. Ciders are minimally processed to "balance acids, sugars and tannins to express true character of the apples and fruits."

"We sell fresh fruit, produce, baked goods, cider donuts, sweet and hard cider, New Hampshire Made products," The Bassetts said.

The farm store, on the upper level, is open July-December. During those months, the store offers NH Made gifts, seasonal vegetables, baked goods, donuts and ice cream. Fruits include blueberries, peaches, nectarines, plums, pears, cherries and apricots during their respective seasons. Visitors can pick their own fruit during picking times.

Contoocook Cider Company has cider tasting, food and cider to-go on weekends during the winter. For the summer season, starting the end of May, they add Fridays and live music. They also offer a Sugarhouse Maple Day in March.



Hike, bike and paddle!



A lot of information on New Hampshire state parks can be found at www.nhstateparks. org. The site contains info on hiking trails, pet policies, hours parks are open, any fees required, places handicapped accessible and many other amenities and events. Also check the fish and game website for boating and fishing information.

Note: Drone use is restricted in all New Hampshire state parks.

Hiking:

Sunapee-Ragged-Kearsarge Greenway is 75-miles of hiking trails linking the summits of Sunapee, Ragged and Kearsarge mountains and maintained by the SRKG Coalition. SRKG volunteer members lead hikes throughout the summer, plus there are other events offered. Maps, calendar of events, trail closures, guide book and more can be found at www.srkg.com.

Summer 2023 at Mount Sunapee offers many trails including the ski trails, Summit Hiking Trail, Lake Solitude Hiking Trail and the Newbury Hiking Trail. There's also the Andrew Brook Trail (great for families) off Mountain Road which also will take you to

Lake Solitude. Visit www. mountsunapee.com and click on "Summer at Mount Sunapee" for list of events.

Mt. Kearsarge South (there's a Mt. Kearsarge North in Chatham) can be hiked from two sides. Rollins State Park in Warner has a nice family hike up the mountain. The Wilmot side is a more challenging hike from Winslow State Park.

For suggestions and trail maps, also visit the New London, Newbury or Sunapee information booths. Town halls are also a good source for maps and information compiled by the town's conservation commission.

Pillsbury State Park in Washington, off Rte. 31, is crossed by a network of hiking and mountain bike trails. These trails offer easy to moderate hiking in fairly remote settings. The park is an important link in the Monadnock-Sunapee Greenway, a 51-mile trail connecting Mt. Monadnock with Mt. Sunapee in the north.

Rails to Trails:

Many towns and areas are getting involved in the Rails to Trails movement which turns the old railroad lines into well-maintained four-season recreational trails. These trails provide wonderful easy hiking and biking allowing anyone the opportunity to enjoy the scenic views and experience the natural beauty of the areas. Some allow horseback riding.

One such trail is the 59-mile Northern Rail Trail which runs from the Concord city line to Lebanon. There are many parking areas and trailheads along the route.

The Concord-Lake Sunapee section passes through several towns, some of which still may be in planning stages. The Stevens Rail Trail, 1.3 miles, is between Warner and Hopkinton. The Warner Rail Trail is a 1-mile section. Bradford hosts 1 mile of the Tilly-Wheeler Trail and Lower Lake Todd segment.

Kearsarge-Sunapee area visitors can park at Potter Place at the intersection of Rtes. 4 and 11 in Andover or at the Highland Lake Inn trailhead in East Andover. The Danbury General Store also has trail access along with parking, bathrooms and food. For more information and to find maps and where to park, check www.nhstateparks.org and look under the Trails Bureau or visit www.fnrt.org.

Boating:

In Andover, the Blackwater River is highly recommended for kayaking. Also, Highland Lake has a great scenic shoreline. Public boat access is off Channel Road.


Bradford's Lake Massasecum has a public boat ramp off Rte. 114 with limited parking.

Eastman Lake, aka Eastman Pond is located in Enfield, Grantham and Springfield. Public boat access is at Eastman West and has a 10 mph speed limit.

In New London, try the Little Lake Sunapee and explore around Colby Point if you like loons. Also, Pleasant Lake has a town beach and public boat ramp in Elkins. located mostly in New London.

Kezar Lake, North Sutton, is another good bet for canoeing or kayaking. The public boat ramp is next to Smiley Grove in North Sutton village near the beach. You can also hike or bike the 3 miles around the lake. If you're lucky, you can spot the nesting eagle.

Lake Sunapee, the fifth largest lake in the state offers four boat ramps, 11 islands and three lighthouses.


